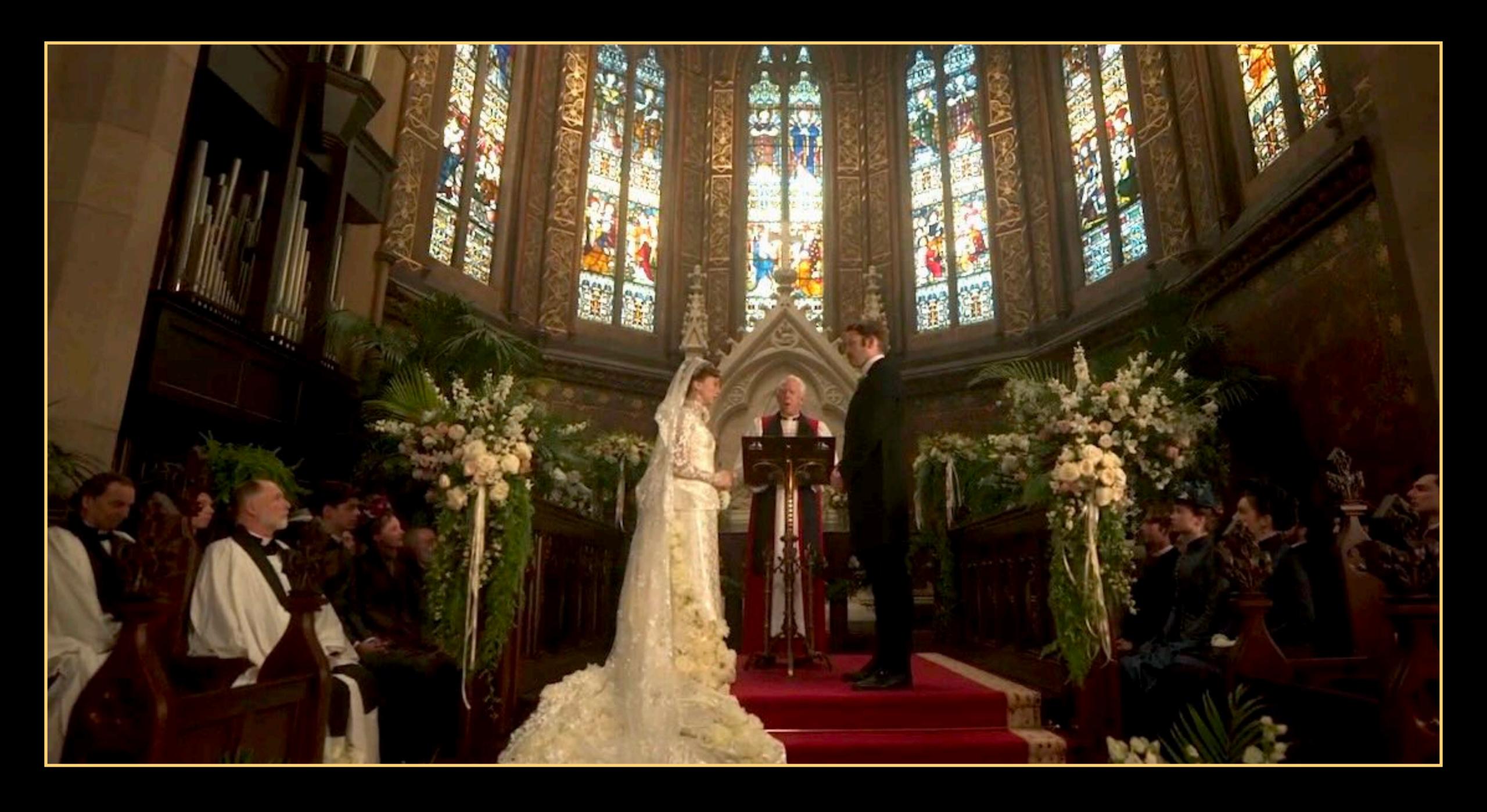

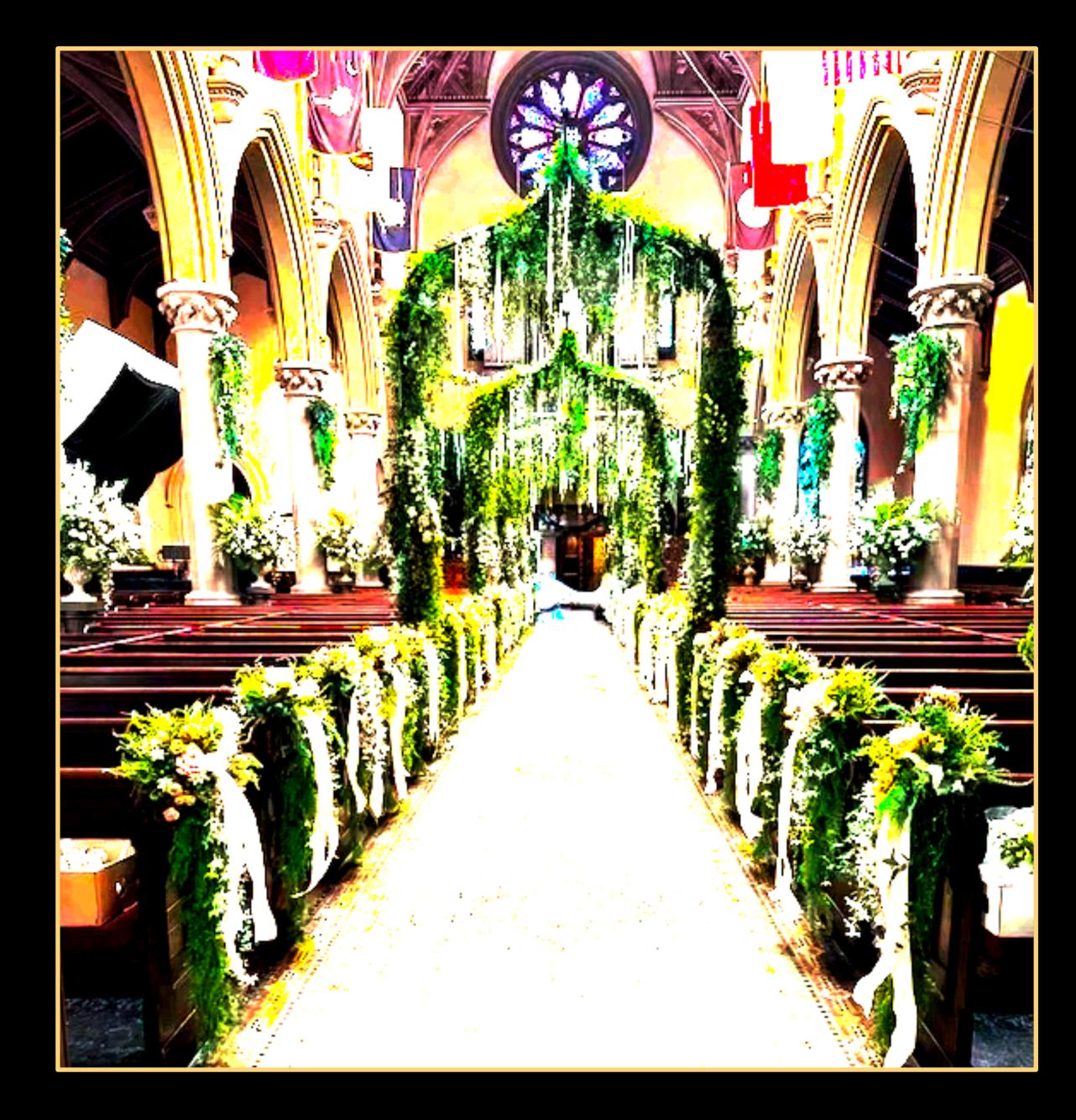

Gladys travels to her new home in England on the HMHS Brittanic





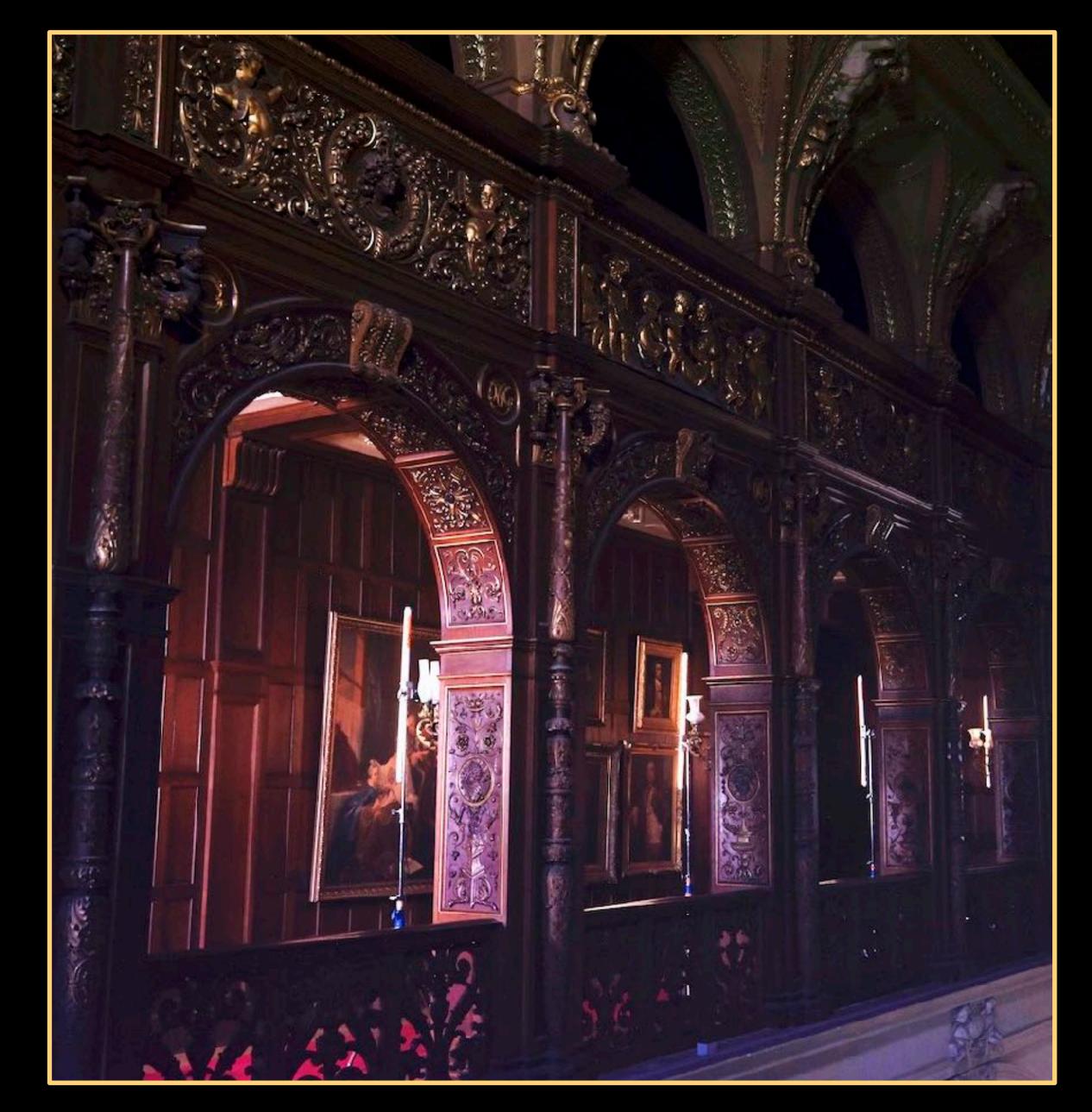
Only the port holes and low exiling of the set suggest that we are on a ship



Sidmouth Castle is a massive estate in Oxfordshire England, soon to be renovated with the proceeds from Gladys's dowry



It took four different locations to suggest the scale of Sidmouth Castle. The great entry is at Ochre Court in Newport RI

Our saloon was built on the back lot for a practical relationship to the street



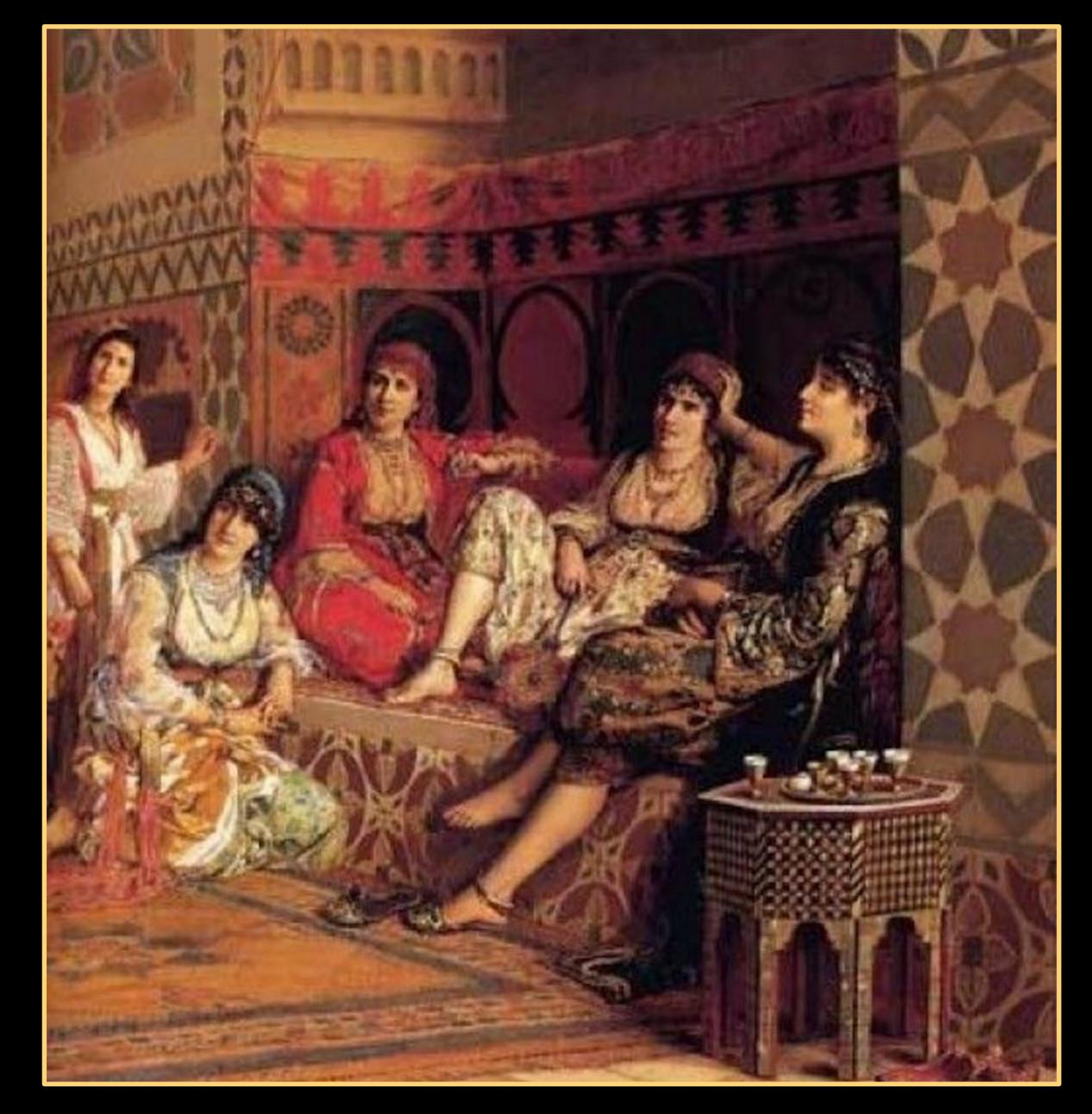


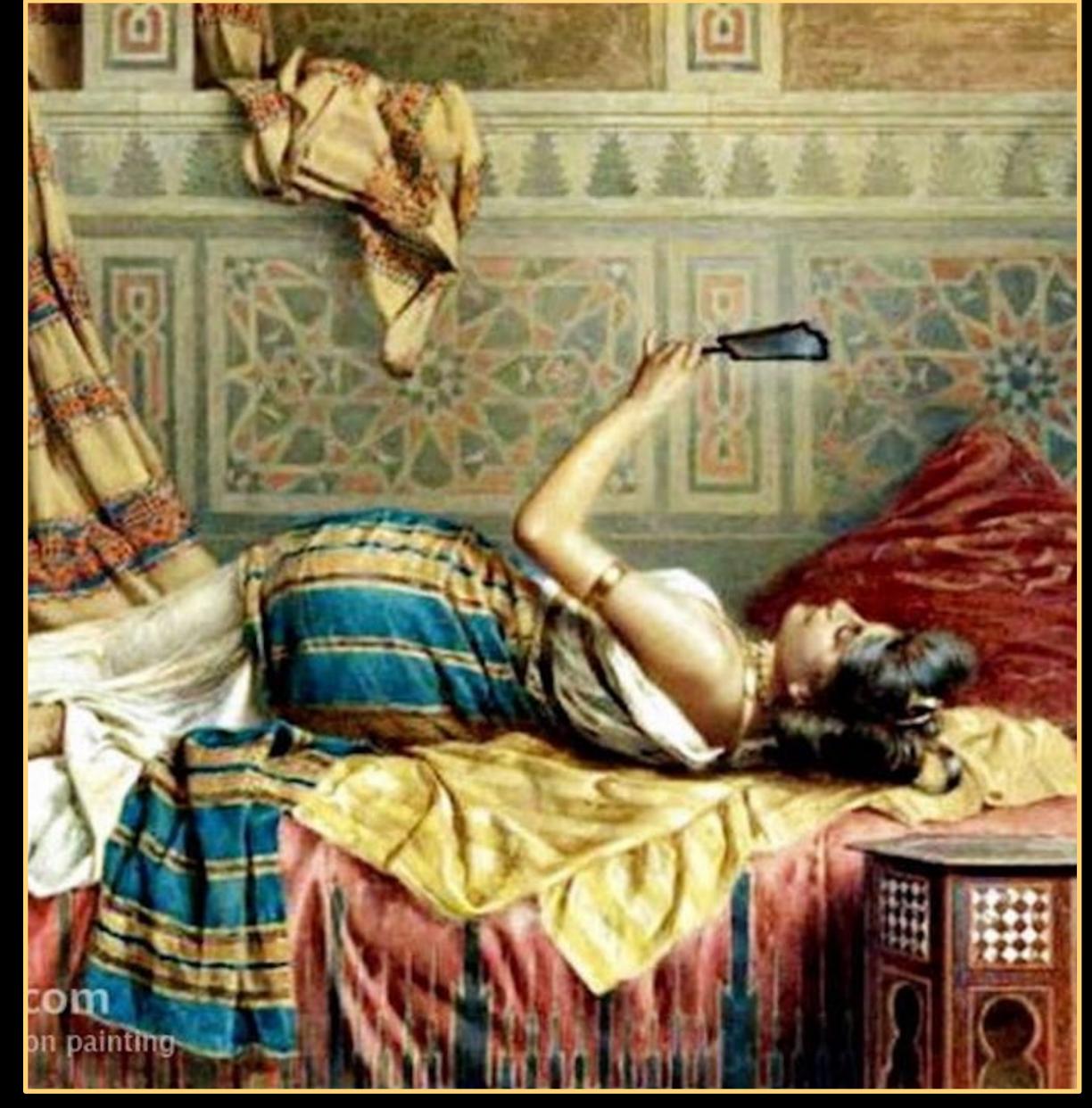

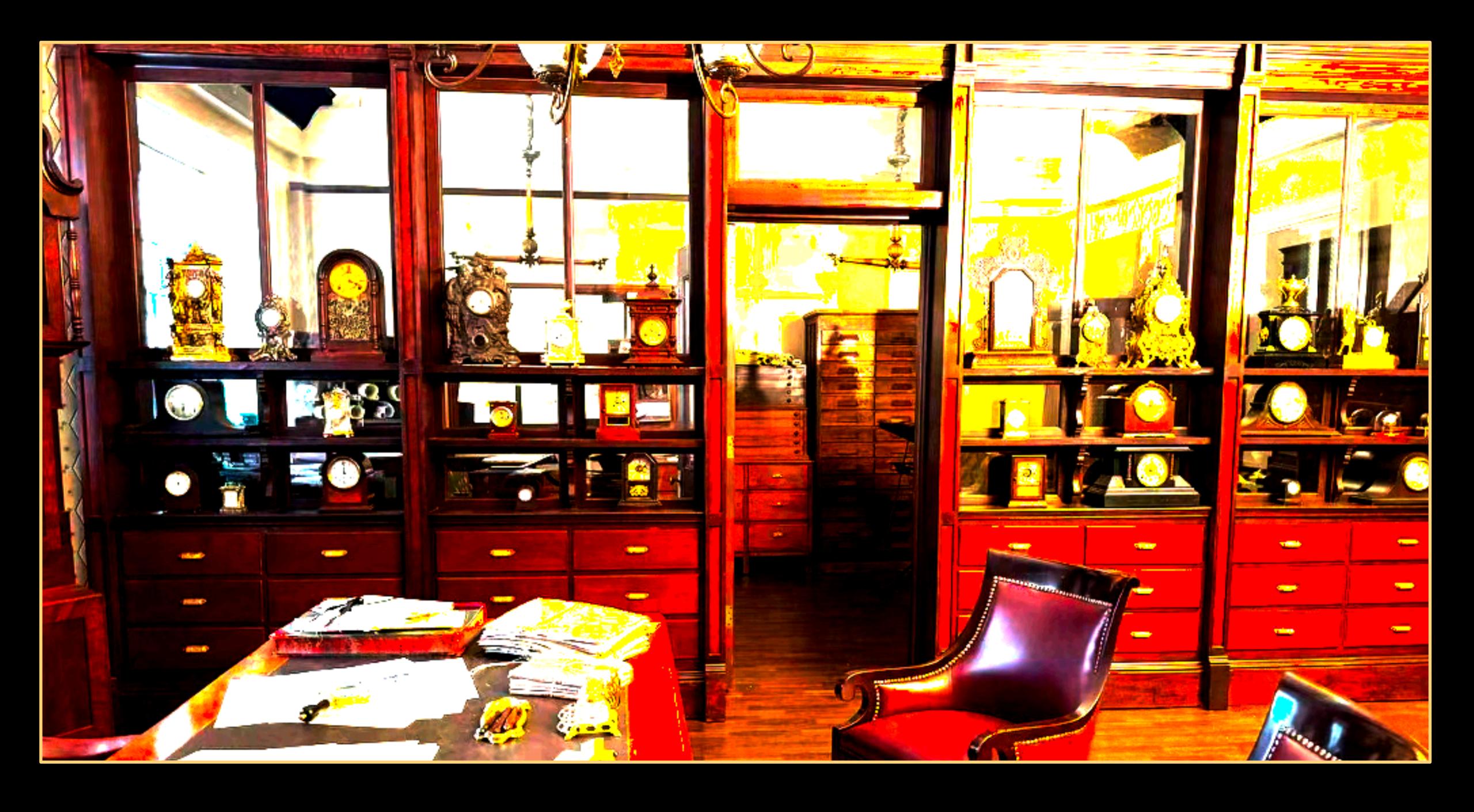
Jack, the van Rhijn footman, sold his design for a new improved alarm clock. The windfall profile profits make him a very wealthy man

George and Larry discuss family matters before the ball



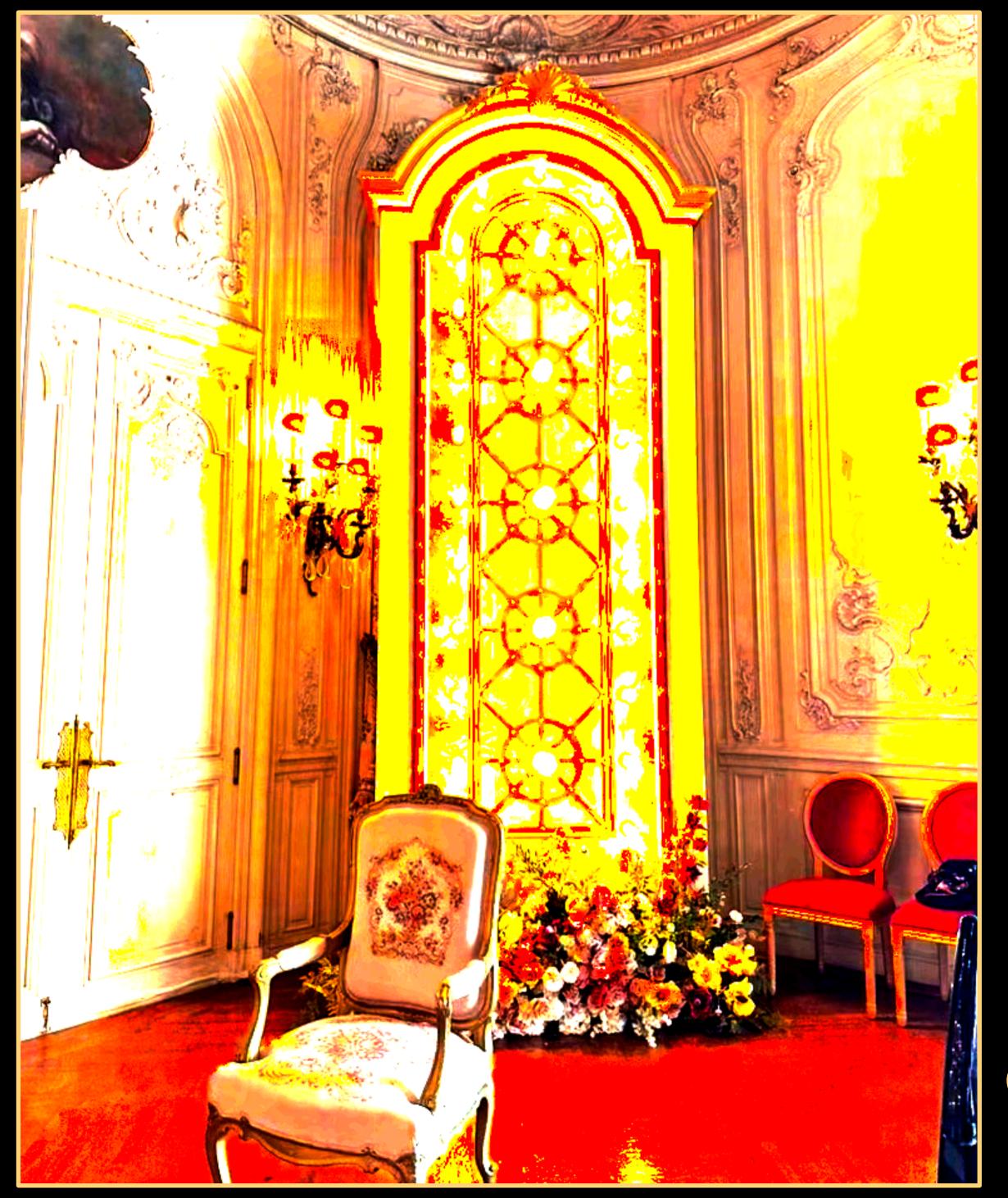
The arrival of Mrs Astor means the event will be a success
